The following letter was passed unanimously by the Housing and Transportation Committee on 1-31-2018.

January 31, 2018

To: Directors of Community Development in Marin County

Re: Education and Outreach to Older Adults regarding Accessory Selling Units (ADUs) and Junior Accessory Selling Units (JAUD)

The Commission on Aging advocates for the well-being of the 65,000 older adults in Marin County. We strongly support the work to educate and counsel senior homeowners and others on their opportunities to add Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU) and Junior Accessory Dwelling Units (JAUD) to their home. Our surveys of older adults document that many are "house-rich and cash-poor" and are worried that they won't have the income to stay in their homes. The counseling helps solve that problem, and produces more affordable housing that Marin County so badly needs.

State and local governments agree that developing more ADUs is an important step to making housing more affordable, and the recent passage of California Senate Bill 1069 helps to simplify the application and approval process for ADUs; however, senior homeowners know very little about the ADU opportunity. The Commission on Aging would like to see funding provided to offer education, outreach and counseling to homeowners. Even though state and local governments are streamlining the permitting process, homeowners won't benefit unless they are offered information sessions, individual site visits and costs estimates, help in getting financing, and help in screening renters.

The Commission on Aging has a strong interest in helping homeowners develop ADUs, because 53% of all owner-occupied homes in Marin County are owned by adults over age 60¹. Furthermore, the ADUs become a source of affordable housing for older adults. In summary, the Commission strongly supports organizations like Lily Pad Homes' and others outreach in Marin County.
