This report highlights the collective impact of our Marin CRTs from October-December 2025.

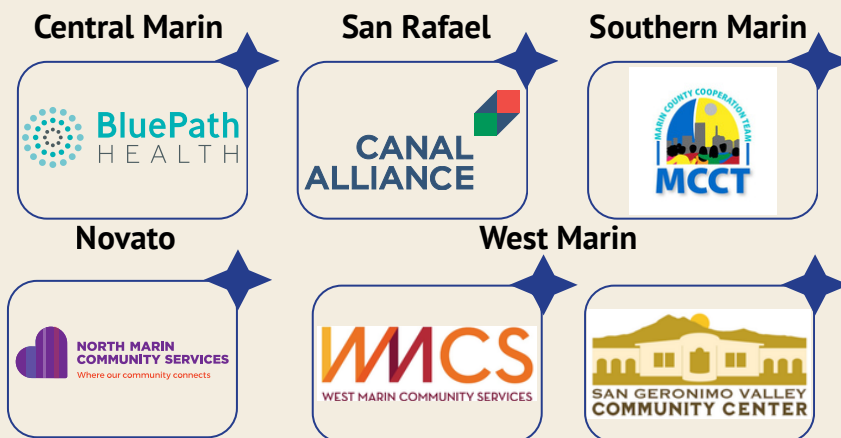
ABOUT THE COMMUNITY RESILIENCY TEAMS

The Community Resiliency Teams (CRTs) bring together neighbors, local leaders, and organizations across Marin County to equitably strengthen our collective health, preparedness, and resilience.

Each CRT is led by a local Lead Agency that brings together “Zone Partners” — community-based organizations, schools, clinics, faith groups, city and county agencies, and more. CRTs bring together over 80 Zone Partners to collaborate on shared goals.

Every effort — from distributing food and resources, to hosting health fairs and preparedness trainings — reflects the CRTs’ shared commitment to care and collaboration. Together, Marin’s CRTs are building a more resilient, informed, and connected community for all.

SUCCESS HIGHLIGHTS

CRTs expanded community readiness this quarter through outreach, partnerships, trainings and exercises, and bilingual education.

Building a Culture of Preparedness

- Each Lead Agency and at least one Zone Partner participated in a tabletop exercise with OEM, Marin HHS, and Marin VOAD to test their emergency plans and exercise communications and coordination before, during, and after an emergency.
- West Marin CRT partnered with SF Card to host an emergency preparedness workshop for the Bo-Linda Vista Community.
- Canal Alliance hosted a community fair focused on sea-level rise awareness, preparedness, and health, attended by over 200 people.

San Rafael and West Marin CRT Zones strengthened coordination and partnerships with Ritter Center and Marin Community Clinic to expand access to harm reduction expertise and resources.

Preventing Overdoses

CRTs and partners distributed 652 Naloxone kits and 237 Fentanyl Test Strips to the community and trained 214 people on Naloxone use.

Central Marin partnered with Overdose Free Marin (ODFM) and Marin 9 to 25 to deliver care packages to 175 transitional age youth and foster youth CRT Lead agencies participate in the OD Free Marin Education and Outreach Action Team.

Increase Access to Services

CRTs increase access to services through a variety of strategies.

- This quarter, CRT Lead Agencies hosted 8 health fairs, which were attended by over 960 community members. These place-based health fairs provided bilingual health education, emergency preparedness resources, vaccinations, vision screenings, and overdose prevention resources.
- To support community members impacted by the Federal Government shutdown, each CRT Lead Agency coordinated additional support to community members through additional food distribution, direct assistance, or hot meals. NMCS opened an emergency food pantry 4 times and raised funds to distribute \$21,000 of Grocery Outlet gift cards. MCCT served over 720 individuals hot meals through their emergency food relief program.
- Thanks to financial support from Marin Community Foundation's Food on Every Table Fund, CRTs provided rapid direct assistance to over 1,200 households, benefiting approximately 3,500 people.
- Each Lead Agency participates in Healthy Marin Partnership, a multi-disciplinary collaborative that strives to achieve health equity and meaningful improvements in health outcomes.
