If my child has this disease, when can he or she return to school or child care?

Children with pinworm are not restricted from school or child care.

Pinworm or "threadworm" is an infection caused by a small, thin, white roundworm that sometimes lives in the colon and rectum of humans.

Children in school, preschool, or child care, get pinworm most often. It can also affect people who live in institutions, or members of a household of a person who has pinworm.

It causes:

 Itching around the anus which can cause trouble sleeping and restlessness.

How is pinworm spread?

Pinworm is spread by the fecal-oral route when pinworm eggs are transferred from the anus to the mouth. This happens:

- By hand
- Through contact with clothing, bedding, food, or other items shared with a person who has pinworm

What can I do now?

Watch your child for symptoms and call your child's doctor or health care provider if your child becomes sick. You may want to talk to your doctor or health care provider to see if all members of your home should receive medication.

If your child gets sick, prevent others from getting ill by:

- Do not share clothing, towels, or bedding
- Wash clothes, towels, and bedding in hot water (131 degrees F or higher)
- Avoid takings baths together. Take showers.
- Wash hands with soap and water after using the bathroom, changing diapers, and before handling food.
- Clean and vacuum the house daily for several days to prevent eggs from spreading.
- Bathe and change to clean underwear, night clothes, and bedsheets frequently.
- Keep nails short.
